This walking and cycling route follows the River Soar and Grand Union Canal out of Leicester, north through Watermead Country Park to Cossington.

The Rally is a wedge of parkland which is skirted by terraced back gardens and the Grand Union Canal. Once part of the historic Leicester and Swannington Railway, it now features a BMX trail, football pitch and children's play area.

The Rally is a 'crossroads' for Leicester's cycle network, with routes to the north towards Watermead Country Park, and south along the Great Central Way towards Blaby and beyond. Other routes lead to the City Centre, Beaumont Leys and Leicester's West End.

Abbey Park lies approximately a mile north of the City Centre. The River Soar divides this beautiful park into two distinct areas. To the east of the river lies the Victorian part of the park with its evergreen shrubberies, trees, boating lake, Chinese themed friendship garden,

West of the river lies the fascinating Abbey Grounds with remains of the twelfth century Leicester Abbey and the ruins of a seventeenth century mansion, as well as the popular Pets Corner and a childrens' play area.

#### **Abbey Pumping** Station

Abbey Pumping Station, is the Space Centre's historic but equally innovative neighbour. Together, the two attractions tell the story of 200 years of science and technology.

Opened in 1891, the Pumping

Station pumped Leicester's sewage to the treatment works at Beaumont Leys. The grand Victorian building and beautifully decorated beam engines were a cause of great civic pride. Belgrave Hall is in the conservation area of the former village of Belgrave, now a bustling suburb of Leicester. ### **Watermead Country** Park (South)

This is the southern end of the park which stretches from Belgrave up to Syston. Watermead was created in the 1980s by Leicester City Council, Leicestershire County Council, and Charnwood Borough Council, using land reclaimed from former gravel pits.

It is a haven for wildlife and a peaceful stretch of countryside, easily accessible for many people. One of Watermead Country Park South's best known features is a life size replica of a Mammoth, sitting atop a hill with great views of the park.

The park is largely a wetland area with two lakes and a Climate Play Trail. Running through the Park are the River Soar and Grand Union Canal which

provide an essential corridor for wildlife. Cycling and walking paths (including National Cycle Route 6) run throughout

## (10) Birstall

A short walk or cycle ride from the Mammoth finds you at Birstall Lock. The bridge at the lock is now fully accessible to cyclists, people using wheelchairs and parents with buggies. The bridge was revamped as part of Sustrans' Connect2 project.

On the other side of the bridge sits the scenic **White Horse** pub, and it's only a short walk from here to the shops and services of Birstall.



# Thurmaston

Thurmaston village is linked to Birstall by one of the many Connect2 routes. It is only a mile across Watermead Country Park from village to village using the new route.

The bridges at Thurmaston Lock (improved as part of the Sustrans **Connect2** project) lead you out through Mill Lane to Melton Road - home to village shops and pubs. Across the A607 (road bridges help pedestrians and cyclists cross the dual carriageway) is Thurmaston Shopping Centre including shops, places to eat and a



#### **Watermead Country** Park (North)

The northern end of Watermead **Country Park**, much like the southern, is an area of wetlands. The largest lake is King Lear's Lake, a popular fishing spot, also used by several clubs and societies including triathletes, open water swimming clubs, Newfoundland dog teams and model boaters. The lake's edge is home to a dinosaur play trail and close-by is a bird hide and wild flower meadow.

Close to Thurmaston Lock Bridge, a short walk from King Lear's Lake is a 'portrait bench' depicting a Bronze Age man and woman and an Aurochs (an extinct wild ox). Bronze Age human remains and those of an Aurochs were found in the park's former life as a gravel pit. The bench commemorates Sustrans' Connect2 project and was installed in 2011.

Syston town centre lies to the north east of Watermead Country Park. The town features a large shopping area and has a railway station with links to Leicester, Loughborough, Nottingham and beyond.

Just across Wanlip Lane from the northern entrance is the Hope and Anchor pub, popular with canal boaters. This is one of several pubs and places to eat in the area.





Cossington is a small village to the north of Watermead Country Park. The village is home to two garden centres and a public house, The Royal Oak.








